Measuring an impressive 84 feet in length with an unbelievable 35-foot beam, she is as comfortable and magnificent as can be. A triple

up to 36 guests on a day sail.

The Captain, Warren Blake was kind enough to show me around.

Long Ranger boasts 4 air-conditioned cabins (with bathrooms attached) plus a personal TV/DVD player in each of them. There is also a spacious saloon (air-conditioned too) - fitted with 2 plasma TVs and a home entertainment system. Food is prepared in the galley (that's what they call a kitchen on a yacht) and it comes complete with a fridge, freezer, microwave oven, conventional oven and stove.

On extended charters to islands off the east coast of Malaysia, Captain Blake explained that the saloon could be converted to a sleeping area to accommodate more guests. Long Ranger is able to take up to 16 guests to nice and pristine waters off Tioman, Pulau Aur or the Leeward Isles.

Before casting off, Captain Blake went through the formalities (safety briefing) and judging by the amount of beers and wines in the coolers - I would say that he was spot-on by conducting a safety briefing before the first beer can was opened.

While cruising, I thought to myself that it would be really nice to have a family gathering on board. And when you have a big family like



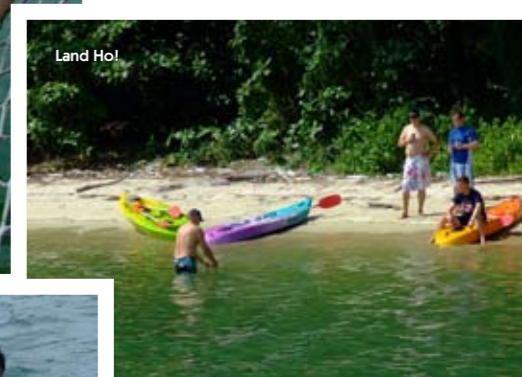

Lunch was served and it included roast lamb, hotdogs, cheese, potato salad and all the things that make you go "yumilicious". With our bellies filled, we started cruising and some of us decided to have a go with the boom net. This is a must-try if you ever board the Long Ranger. Getting "dragged" in the sea can be quite an experience!

Before we knew it, it was time to dock and we said farewell to Captain Blake and the crew. I promised that I would be in touch real soon for another trip. I was fortunate to have experienced Long Ranger, and it is only fair that my family and friends get to do the same.

THE OLD MAN AND THE S.E.A SKIPPER'S PROFILE CAPTAIN WARREN BLAKE

In 1964, a young Warren Blake built a tiny 9 metre trimaran and sailed away from Auckland, New Zealand. His parents approved of a circumnavigation of the globe under sail on condition that he return to New Zealand, get a proper job and marry a nice kiwi lass. Unknown to the parents, their son's dreams revolves around a grand trip along the circumference of the earth with hopes of some conspiracy with a beautiful brown Princess to overthrow a despotic Sultan and rule in benign splendour over a gem-like tropic isle... The final outcome differs in detail, broadly similar in felicity but without the conspiracy.

Warren sailed to the South Pacific French colonies, and was entranced by what seems to him at that time, beautiful sylph-like creatures with prominent cheekbones and long, silky black hair. They were the Les Tonquinoises, Girls of Tonkin, North Vietnam. Little did he know that, years later, he would in reality marry one of them in her native country (but no despotic Sultan throughout the process).

Captain Blake first sailed into Singapore in April 1965, on the eve of Independence and has been sailing and exploring the seas, islands and rivers of South East Asia ever since. He has found many wonderful, hidden corners of distant archipelagos which the heavy hand of Man had barely touched. Sadly, most of these have since been "developed", with concrete, garbage dumps and golf courses where birds, jungle and coral used to live in natural splendour.

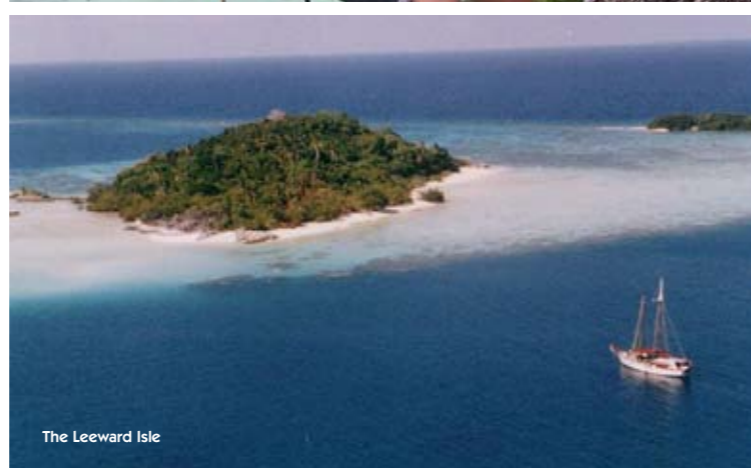
